

GOSPEL READING LK 14:1, 7-14

On a sabbath Jesus went to dine at the home of one of the leading Pharisees, and the people there were observing him carefully.

He told a parable to those who had been invited, noticing how they were choosing the places of honor at the table. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not recline at table in the place of honor. A more distinguished guest than you may have been invited by him, and the host who invited both of you may approach you and say, 'Give your place to this man.' and then you would proceed with embarrassment to take the lowest place. Rather, when you are invited, go and take the lowest place so that when the host comes to you he may say, 'My friend, move up to a higher position.' Then you will enjoy the esteem of your companions at the table. For every one who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." Then he said to the host who invited him. "When you hold a lunch or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or your wealthy neighbors, in case they may invite you back and you have repayment. Rather, when you hold a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; blessed indeed will you be because of their inability to repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."



Meals played an important role in the society in which Jesus lived. More than a time for sharing nourishment, they were a time to share ideas and to model different aspects of social relationships. In Luke's Gospel, the places that a person ate (at the home of a tax collector, 5:29), the people with whom a person ate (sinners, 5:30), whether a person washed before eating (11:38), and, as is the case here, the place that a person sits while eating are all important. The narrator says Jesus tells a parable, but it is really wise advice to both guests and hosts about finding true happiness at the heavenly banquet.

Jesus warns guests to wait before taking their places at the table lest they be asked to move if someone more important arrives. This is more than just a lesson about dinner etiquette. It is advice on how to find your true place in the Kingdom of God. Jesus advises hosts not to invite people who would be expected to repay them to dinner but to invite those who could not repay: the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. This is where real blessings can be found.

In these sayings, Luke gives us not only advice on how to approach the end times but also on how to live according to Jesus' vision of a good society. Luke's Gospel also advises us how the Church must be part of bringing about this society. It is yet another example in Luke's Gospel of the reversal the kingdom brings about.

SAINT GILES



Born to a wealthy noble family, when his parents <u>died</u>, Giles gave his fortune to help the <u>poor</u>. Known as a <u>miracle</u> worker. To avoid followers and adulation, he left <u>Greece</u> c.<u>683</u> for <u>France</u> where he lived as a <u>hermit</u> in a cave in the <u>diocese</u> of <u>Nimes</u>, a cave whose mouth was guarded by a thick thorn bush, and a lifestyle so <u>impoverished</u> that, legend says, <u>God</u> sent a <u>deer</u> to Giles to nourish him with her milk.

One day after he had lived there for several years in meditation, a royal hunting party chased the hind into Giles' cave. One huntershot an arrow into the thorn bush, hoping to hit the deer, but instead hit Giles in the leg, crippling him. The king sent doctors to care for hermit's wound, and though Giles begged to be left alone, the king came often to see him. From this, Gile's fame as sage and miracle worker spread, would-be followers gathered near the and cave. The French king, because of his admiration, built the monastery of Saint Gilles du Gard for these followers, and Giles became its first abbot, establishing his own discipline there. A small town grew up around the monastery, and upon Giles' death, his grave became a shrine and place pilgrimage; of the monastery later became a Benedictine house.

The combination of the town, monastery, shrine and pilgrims led to many handicapped beggars hoping for alms; this and Giles' insistence that he wished to live outside the walls of the city, and his own damagedleg. led to his patronage of beggars, and to cripples since begging was the only source of income for many. Hospitals and safe houses for the poor, crippled, and leprous were constructed in England and Scotland, and were built so cripples could reach them easily. On their passage to Tyburn for execution, convicts were allowed to stop at Saint Giles' Hospital where they were presented with a bowl of ale called Saint Giles' Bowl, "thereof to drink at their pleasure, as their last refreshing in this life." Once in Scotlandduring the seventeenth century his relics were stolen from a church and a great riot occurred.

In <u>Spain</u>, <u>shepherds</u> consider Giles the protector of <u>rams</u>. It was formerly the custom to wash the <u>rams</u>and colour their wool a bright shade on Giles' <u>feast</u> day, tie lighted candles to their horns, and bring the <u>animals</u> down the mountain paths to the <u>chapels</u> and churches to have them <u>blessed</u>. Among the <u>Basques</u>, the <u>shepherds</u> come down from the Pyrenees on <u>1 September</u>, attired in full costume, sheepskin coats, staves, and crooks, to attend <u>Mass</u> with their best <u>rams</u>, an event that marks the beginning of autumn festivals, marked by processions and dancing in the fields. One of the <u>Fourteen</u> <u>Holy Helpers</u>.
