Fifth Sunday of Easter

My dear parishioners,

Here are some more of my scattered thoughts...

I would like to congratulate 36 children who are receiving Jesus Christ for the first time in their lives this weekend. May their love for the Sacrament grow each day. Thank you to all of those who helped prepare them for their First Holy Communion.

Being a disciple of Jesus Christ is a willingness to love. How many times have we heard with our ears and with our hearts the words in today's Gospel, "Love one another," Jesus' commandment! This is not a suggestion, but a real mandate and it is a challenge to put it into practice daily till death. It is a way of life, a way of love, and it should be our works. How did Jesus love? He loved without counting the cost! We cannot truly love if we lack open ears and hearts to the needs of others. Only the one who can love can know God, for God is Love. Do we want to be in the state of love? Pass on our faith in love—Christ is Alive!

Jesus gave us on commandment—To Love One Another. Be aware of God's love for us so we can love one another. Jesus goes on to say that having love for one another is how He will know who his disciple are. As disciples of Jesus Christ, we need to be reminded constantly of God's commandment, "Love one another as I have loved you."

As I read and reflect on the Acts of the Apostles during this Easter Season, my understanding and appreciation of discipleship is growing...Listening and appreciating the love of God allows us to live the commandment of love one another day in and day out, even if is involves suffering! We are called to appreciate God's love for us and in this appreciation, we are able to show love to others in a simple and meaningful way.—Accept people as they are.

Love always involves a relationship. Hatred destroys relationships. How did Jesus love us? Throughout the Gospels, Jesus always repaired what was broken in His time...sickness, infirmity, sin...Jesus healed and forgave. Jesus did that because He has always prayerfully united with God the Father to do the will of the Father.—Love always involves a relationship, and hatred destroys relationships!

We are called (if we really want to be Jesus' disciples) to keep His mission of love alive. We need to continue, to carry on His mission of love—by repairing what is broken in ourselves, our families, community, and throughout the world.

Today's Gospel again comes from the Gospel of John. Like last week, today we hear words spoken by Jesus before his death and Resurrection. Jesus is teaching at the Last Supper.

John's Gospel does not include an institution of the Eucharist narrative; instead, Jesus washes his disciples' feet. Immediately after, Jesus predicts his betrayal by Judas. Today's Gospel follows that prediction. It can be read as a continuing explanation of Jesus' act of washing his disciples' feet. It begins with the announcement that this is the moment when the Son of Man will be glorified. This theme continues throughout John's Passion. Jesus will be glorified in his death on the cross and in his Resurrection, and the disciples will glorify Jesus in the love they show.

John's Gospel does not present a sentimental view of love. This is a type of love that is shown in service and sacrifice. It is difficult to choose to love when faced with hatred and anger. Jesus tells the disciples that all will know that they are his disciples because of the love they show for one another. This description of the early Christian community will be repeated in the Acts of the Apostles: "See how they love one another." Christian love is the hallmark of Christianity. We see it lived in the witness of the martyrs. We see it in the example of the lives of the saints. We see it in the holy women and men who live and love daily, making small and large sacrifices for others.

ST. ISIDORE THE FARMER

FEAST DAY: MAY 15



Isidore has become the patron of farmers and rural c ommunities. In particular, he is the patron of Madrid, Spain, and of the United States National Rural Life Conference.

When he was barely old enough to wield a hoe, Isidore entered the service of John de Vergas, a wealthy landowner from Madrid, and worked faithfully on his estate outside the city for the rest of his life. He married a young woman as simple and upright as himself who also became a saint—Maria de la Cabeza. They had one son, who died as a child.

Isidore had deep religious instincts. He rose early in the morning to go to church and spent many a holiday devoutly visiting the churches of Madrid and surrounding areas. All day long, as he walked behind the plow, he communed with God. His devotion, one might say, became a problem, for his fellow workers sometimes complained that he often showed up late because of lingering in church too long.

He was known for his love of the poor, and there are accounts of Isidore's supplying them miraculously with food. He had a great concern for the proper treatment of animals.

He died May 15, 1130, and was declared a saint in 1622, with Saints Ignatius of Loyola, Francis Xavier, Teresa of Avila, and Philip Neri. Together, the group is known in Spain as "the five saints."

Reflection

Many implications can be found in a simple laborer achieving sainthood: Physical labor has dignity; sainthood does not stem from status; contemplation does not depend on learning; the simple life is conducive to holiness and happiness. Legends about angel helpers and mysterious oxen indicate that his work was not neglected and his duties did not go unfulfilled. Perhaps the truth which emerges is this: If you have your spiritual self in order, your earthly commitments will fall into order also. "[S]eek first the kingdom [of God] and his righteousness," said the carpenter from Nazareth, "and all these things will be given you besides" (Matthew 6:33).


