1st SUNDAY OF ADVENT 11/27/2022

My dear parishioners,

Once again, here are some of my scattered thoughts...

- 1) Time flies and here we are—another Advent! Advent is, of course, a time to prepare—our homes, our lives, and especially our hearts. As we begin this new liturgical year and Advent season, Jesus tells us that we need to be awake, to be alert and to be watchful for His coming at the end of time.
- 2) Advent is a rich and powerful season. Don't let Christmas parties, shopping and other preparations for Christmas distract us from the true meaning of Christmas—celebration of the birthday of Christ! Advent is also a time for us to hear the call—to prepare the way for Jesus, in our world, for others...to become a John the Baptist, to be an instrument of grace for others.
- 3) One of the best ways to prepare the way for the Lord, may I suggest—from now until Christmas, spend your prayer time to read the Gospel of the day, especially the Gospel of that Sunday. Then speak honestly to the Lord about whatever is in your heart. God hears us when we pray. He also speaks to us when we pray. May your Advent be filled with hope, joy and love! Come Lord Jesus, come! Happy New Year—Happy Advent Season!
- 4) On December 12th, we honor Mary as "Our Lady of Guadalupe," the patroness of the Americas. This Feast Day offers us an opportunity to reflect on living our faith with the love, compassion, and respect that Mary herself exhibited. On this feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, we recall the appearance of Mary before Saint Juan Diego, a poor Aztec Indian peasant, on the hill in Mexico in 1531. Mary spoke to Juan Diego in his native tongue...Mary's love and compassion were extended to the people of Mexico and beyond. May Mary's love, kindness and respect towards Juan Diego, a poor peasant, be a powerful example for us to emulate as the way of dealing with others—people and cultures. Let us celebrate the Feat Day of Our Lady of Guadalupe on December 12th with a great enthusiastic love. Our Lady of Guadalupe, pray for us! Happy Feast Day to our Spanish speaking brothers and sisters!

Today is the first Sunday of Advent, which is also the first Sunday of a new liturgical year for the Church. The Advent season includes the four Sundays that precede Christmas. It is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. Key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice.

In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Matthew will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle A). In today's Gospel, we hear Jesus speak about the need for wakefulness, for watchful waiting, for the coming of the Son of Man.

Matthew's Gospel is dated by most scholars after 70 A.D. Most believe that Matthew wrote for a primarily Jewish community, but one that was no longer centered on the Temple in Jerusalem. These were Jewish Christians trying to come to terms with their relationship to Judaism in a new situation: Judaism after the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem. There may have been Christians who believed that the events of the world around them gave evidence of the imminent return of the Lord in glory. The passage from Matthew we read today is rather straightforward. No one knows the precise time of the coming of the Lord in glory, so watchful waiting and vigilance are required. The passage speaks to the uselessness of looking for signs; there will be none. As a thief sneaks in during the night, so will the Lord's coming in glory be.

The question for us as members of the Christian community, then, is how do we prepare for this?

Today's passage speaks more about the manner of waiting, rather than the details of the preparation. Jesus compares the vigilance required of Christians to the vigilance of a homeowner who knows the plans of the thief. If one knows that the thief's action is imminent, one remains watchful. As Christians, we know that our Lord is coming even if we cannot know the precise timing. Jesus calls us to be watchful and vigilant, like the homeowner. If we become lax in our Christian living, we may be caught unprepared.

SAINT ANDREW

SAINTS OF THE DAY: NOVEMBER 30



Andrew was Saint Peter's brother, and was called with him. "As [Jesus] was walking by the sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon who is now called Peter, and his brother Andrew, casting a net into the sea; they were fishermen. He said to them, 'Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.' At once they left their nets and followed him" (Matthew 4:18-20).

John the Evangelist presents Andrew as a disciple of John the Baptist. When Jesus walked by one day, John said, "Behold, the Lamb of God." Andrew and another disciple followed Jesus. "Jesus turned and saw them following him and said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi (which translated means Teacher), where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come, and you will see.' So they went and saw where he was staying, and they stayed with him that day" (John 1:38-39a).

Little else is said about Andrew in the Gospels. Before the multiplication of the loaves, it was Andrew who spoke up about the boy who had the barley loaves and fishes. When the Gentiles went to see Jesus, they came to Philip, but Philip then had recourse to Andrew.

Legend has it that Andrew preached the Good News in what is now modern Greece and Turkey and was crucified at Patras on an X-shaped cross.

Reflection

As in the case of all the apostles except Peter and John, the Gospels give us little about the holiness of Andrew. He was an apostle. That is enough. He was called personally by Jesus to proclaim the Good News, to heal with Jesus' power and to share his life and death. Holiness today is no different. It is a gift that includes a call to be concerned about the Kingdom, an outgoing attitude that wants nothing more than to share the riches of Christ with all people.
