Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God 01/01/2023

My dear OLQW Family,

It is so good to gather here this morning on this first day of 2023 to thank God for all of His gifts in our lives, especially the gifts we had during this past year. The life of Jesus began with Mary; therefore it is appropriate that we begin the New Year with the Feast of Mary, the Mother of God. She is the Mother of God, Mother of Joy, Joy to the World. So, we begin this first day of the New Year by greeting one another – "Happy New Year!"

Let us go to Bethlehem to see Mary, Joseph and Jesus, the Holy Family. This scene is right here in our church to visit. Jesus awaits us in the manger, extending an invitation to mankind and to each one of us to respond. Respond to his love! Let us respond by seeking Him in our hearts and in those around us.

I want to share with you the prayer of the family life that I receives from one of our parishioners.

Dear Lord, with Mary and Joseph, you have lived within a family. Show me ever new ways to protect and comfort those closest to me, And let me, each day, do something that will say "I love you" Without speaking the words.

But remind me also to frequently say those words.

Let me never part from any member of my family in anger.

Prompt me always to turn back without delay – to forgive, and to be forgiven!

And let me see your image within each person in my own family.

And in my greater family.

Knowing that in your kingdom we will truly be one family.
United by your sacrifice on the cross. Amen.

So, on this first day of the New Year let us ask for the graces to Jesus more intimately and love Him more ardently and follow Him more closely so that this may be a truly Happy New Year for all of us.

New Year's Blessings, Father Tom



Today's reading is a continuation from the Gospel proclaimed at the Christmas Mass at midnight. In it the shepherds act upon the message they receive from the angel and go to find Jesus in the manger in Bethlehem. In their visit to the manger, the shepherds find things just as the angel had said. The shepherds' visit, therefore, is a moment of fulfillment, manifestation, and the beginning of the salvation we receive through Christ.

In the context of today's Solemnity, this reading also helps us focus on Mary as the Mother of God. The reading tells us at least three things about Mary as a mother. First, Mary is described as a reflective person, keeping the reports of the shepherds in her heart. Second, we are reminded of how obedient Mary was to God when she named the baby Jesus as the angel Gabriel had directed. Third, this reading shows Mary and Joseph faithfully observing their Jewish tradition by having Jesus circumcised.

Mary's faithfulness to God is evident in all three of these things. Her reflection upon the events in her life indicates that she was a person of prayer. This prayer made possible her obedience to God and God's will, even if the outcome was not clear. Finally, her faithfulness to a community of faith grounded her relationship with God and enabled her to participate in God's plan of salvation.

Because of Mary's faithfulness to God, she was able to receive the gift of God's Son and accept her role in God's plan for salvation. By doing so, she models for us the path of discipleship and is also called Mother of the Church.

Our call to discipleship also includes these three aspects. First, discipleship means prayer and reflection on the events of our lives that we might see God's presence and work in our lives. Second, discipleship means obedience to God and God's will. Third, discipleship includes fidelity to a community of faith.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY, THE MOTHER OF GOD



Mary's divine motherhood broadens the Christmas spotlight. Mary has an important role to play in the Incarnation of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. She consents to God's invitation conveyed by the angel (Luke 1:26-38). Elizabeth proclaims: "Most blessed are you among women and blessed is the *fruit of your womb*. And how does this happen to me, that *the mother of my Lord* should come to me?" (Luke 1:42-43, emphasis added). Mary's role as mother of God places her in a unique position in God's redemptive plan.

Without naming Mary, Paul asserts that "God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law" (Galatians 4:4). Paul's further statement that "God sent the spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying out 'Abba, Father!" helps us realize that Mary is mother to all the brothers and sisters of Jesus.

Some theologians also insist that Mary's motherhood of Jesus is an important element in God's creative plan. God's "first" thought in creating was Jesus. Jesus, the incarnate Word, is the one who could give God perfect love and worship on behalf of all creation. As Jesus was "first" in God's mind, Mary was "second" insofar as she was chosen from all eternity to be his mother.

The precise title "Mother of God" goes back at least to the third or fourth century. In the Greek form *Theotokos* (God-bearer), it became the touchstone of the Church's teaching about the Incarnation. The Council of Ephesus in 431 insisted that the holy Fathers were right in calling the holy virgin *Theotokos*. At the end of this particular session, crowds of people marched through the street shouting: "Praised be the *Theotokos*!" The tradition reaches to our own day. In its chapter on Mary's role in the Church, Vatican II's *Dogmatic Constitution on the Church* calls Mary "Mother of God" 12 times.

Reflection:

Other themes come together at today's celebration. It is the Octave of Christmas: Our remembrance of Mary's divine motherhood injects a further note of Christmas joy. It is a day of prayer for world peace: Mary is the mother of the Prince of Peace. It is the first day of a new year: Mary continues to bring new life to her children—who are also God's children.
