
Each person has a different set of values in life. What are your values in life? Fame, popularity, respectability, luxury home, money, expensive car...? This Sunday's readings issue a direct challenge to all types of worldly life styles and tell us to get our priorities right.

According to the Gospel, our Faith is the treasure we have and we are heirs to the Kingdom of God. It is so important and valuable that everybody must give it absolute priority. There is no short cuts to it and we can't achieve it without a lot of effort everyday. This treasure can be found in ordinary places since God is constantly speaking to us in the simplicity of out lives. We need to open our eyes to His presence and search for Him in the bits and pieces of everyday happenings. We need to spend time in prayers and take a good look at ourselves to try to discover what God is saying to us at any given moment—can be a call to new growth and an adventure in holiness.

It is a day to reflect on the depth and value we put on our Faith in Christ. How many can honestly say that nothing else matters but this precious gift handed down to us by our parents and by the previous generation at such a great cost? We must invest our time and energy for this precious gift of Faith—to focus on Christ and the values He stands for—to share in God's glory.

Today's Gospel concludes three weeks of readings from the 13th Chapter of Matthew's Gospel. Throughout these three weeks we have heard Jesus teaching crowds about the kingdom of heaven, and we have heard Jesus interpret some of his teachings for the disciples. In this week's Gospel, Jesus offers three more short parables.

The first two parables describe the great value of the kingdom of heaven. In the first parable, Jesus says that the kingdom of heaven is like a buried treasure that is worth possessing even if it means giving up everything else. In the second parable, Jesus proposes that the kingdom of heaven is like a pearl of great worth for which one will sell everything else to possess. These parables teach us that we are to place everything we value in the service of the pursuit of the Kingdom of God.

The third parable that Jesus proposes in today's Gospel is different from the first two, but it is reminiscent of the parable of the sower heard in last week's Gospel. The kingdom of heaven is compared to fishing with a wide net. After the fish have been collected, the good fish are kept and the bad fish are thrown away; so too, in the final judgment, will the wicked and the righteous be separated.

Today's Gospel concludes with a curious statement about the scribe who understands the kingdom of heaven. Here a metaphor is offered: this scribe is like the head of a household who "brings from his storeroom both the new and the old." The scribes referred to here are experts of Mosaic law. It is possible that Jesus is here instructing the early Christian community on how to proceed in the interpretation of Jewish law with respect to Jesus' "new" teaching. Jesus' teaching about the kingdom of heaven does not replace the Jewish tradition; it interprets it in a different light.

Saint Eusebius Saint of the Day: August 2



Someone has said that if there had been no Arian heresy denying Christ's divinity, it would be very difficult to write the lives of many early saints. Eusebius is another of the defenders of the Church during one of its most trying periods.

Born on the isle of Sardinia, he became a member of the Roman clergy, and is the first recorded bishop of Vercelli in Piedmont in northwest Italy. Eusebius was also the first to link the monastic life with that of the clergy, establishing a community of his diocesan clergy on the principle that the best way to sanctify his people was to have them see a clergy formed in solid virtue and living in community.

He was sent by Pope Liberius to persuade the emperor to call a council to settle Catholic-Arian troubles. When it was called at Milan, Eusebius went reluctantly, sensing that the Arian block would have its way, although the Catholics were more numerous. He refused to go along with the condemnation of Saint Athanasius; instead, he laid the Nicene Creed on the table and insisted that all sign it before taking up any other matter. The emperor put pressure on him, but Eusebius insisted on Athanasius' innocence and reminded the emperor that secular force should not be used to influence Church decisions. At first the emperor threatened to kill him, but later sent him into exile in Palestine. There the Arians dragged him through the streets and shut him up in a little room, releasing him only after his four-day hunger strike. They resumed their harassment shortly after.

His exile continued in Asia Minor and Egypt, until the new emperor permitted him to be welcomed back to his see in Vercelli. Eusebius attended the Council of Alexandria with Athanasius and approved the leniency shown to bishops who had wavered. He also worked with Saint Hilary of Poitiers against the Arians.

Eusebius died peacefully in his own diocese at what was then considered an advanced age.

Thanksgiving and Worship

One of the manifestations of our worship of God is gratitude. By praying and offering the sacrifice of the Holy Mass, in remembrance of the unique sacrifice offered by His Son on the Cross for our salvation, we thank God for the favors we have received in our lives.

Sanctified by the Holy Eucharist, we are called to offer our gratitude to God for the gift received. The Common Preface IV reminds us of this reality by stating that *"For, although you have no need of our praise, yet our thanksgiving is itself your gift."* Gratitude is therefore a gift from God that takes advantage of us for our salvation, as the same Preface affirms later. The Eucharist, whose original meaning in Greek means "thanksgiving", therefore becomes the best way to offer God our gratitude for the gifts received.

The Second Vatican Council teaches us that in order to take full advantage of the spiritual benefits of Holy Mass, our participation in the Mass must be "full, conscious and active"; that is, we must be aware that what we receive is the Lord Himself, who is given to us in His Body and Blood. The Council itself tells us that "we are aware of this gift when we actively involve our mind, heart and body in all parts of the liturgy, allowing God through His words, actions, gestures, even in moments of silence, to communicate to us."

The gratitude that inspires us to give thanks to God and adore Him in the Eucharist is nourished and enriched by the beauty of the liturgy. Therefore, it is the responsibility of the bishops and priests to prepare and celebrate the Holy Mass with the solemnity and decorum that it requires, following the liturgical books approved for this purpose, avoiding practices that could lead to confusion or abuse.

Another form of our expression of gratitude to God is Eucharistic Adoration, with which we not only adore Jesus present in the Blessed Sacrament, but also join ourselves in a more intimate way to the unique sacrifice of Christ that we celebrate and remember in the Eucharist. Eucharistic Adoration, therefore, helps us to recognize the real presence of Jesus, under the species of bread and wine, not as a simple memory or symbol, but as a reality of His Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity.
