Today we move ahead in our reading of Matthew's Gospel. Last week we read about Jesus walking on the water and the disciples' confession of faith that Jesus is the Son of God. If we were reading Matthew's entire Gospel, we would have read about Jesus' debate with the Pharisees about Jewish purity laws. Jesus argues that it is not what goes into us that makes us unclean; he is referring to the strict Jewish dietary rules. Instead our words and our actions—what comes out of us—make us unclean because they emerge from a heart that is unclean.

Knowing about Jesus' debate with the Pharisees helps us to understand today's Gospel. In fact the story heightens the surprise and shock we feel as we hear Jesus' exchange with the Canaanite woman. The woman, who is not Jewish, approaches Jesus, requesting that he heal her demon-possessed daughter. At first Jesus ignores her; he says nothing. The disciples ask Jesus to send her away, and Jesus agrees, remarking that he was sent to minister to the Jews alone.

The woman persists, paying homage to Jesus, and yet Jesus denies her request again. He even insults her, using a Jewish word of derision for Gentiles, "dog." But the woman cleverly turns Jesus' insult into an affirmation of faith. Only then does Jesus grant her request and heal her daughter.

Jesus' unresponsiveness to this woman may strike us as uncharacteristic or shocking. Yet in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus' ministry is directed primarily to the people of Israel. At only a very few points, such as the one found in today's Gospel, do we find Jesus anticipating the later Christian ministry to the rest of the world.

Behind Matthew's text we can hear this early Christian community's struggle to understand how God's selection of Israel is consistent with two events: Israel's rejection of Jesus and the Gentiles' acceptance of Jesus. Just as Jesus was surprised by the faith expressed by the Canaanite woman, so too the first Christians were surprised that the Gentiles would receive the salvation God offered through Christ. In today's second reading from Paul's letter to the Romans, we hear the apostle Paul considering this same concern.

The faith that the Canaanite woman expresses is an affirmation of and confidence in God's abundant mercy. Yes, salvation comes through Israel, but it overflows for the benefit of all.

Saint Rose of Lima

Saint of the Day: August 23



The first canonized saint of the New World has one characteristic of all saints—the suffering of opposition—and another characteristic which is more for admiration than for imitation—excessive practice of mortification.

She was born to parents of Spanish descent in Lima, Peru, at a time when South America was in its first century of evangelization. She seems to have taken Catherine of Siena as a model, in spite of the objections and ridicule of parents and friends.

The saints have so great a love of God that what seems bizarre to us, and is indeed sometimes imprudent, is simply a logical carrying out of a conviction that anything that might endanger a loving relationship with God must be rooted out. So, because her beauty was so often admired, Rose used to rub her face with pepper to produce disfiguring blotches. Later, she wore a thick circlet of silver on her head, studded on the inside, like a crown of thorns.

When her parents fell into financial trouble, she worked in the garden all day and sewed at night. Ten years of struggle against her parents began when they tried to make Rose marry. They refused to let her enter a convent, and out of obedience she continued her life of penance and solitude at home as a member of the Third Order of Saint Dominic. So deep was her desire to live the life of Christ that she spent most of her time at home in solitude.

During the last few years of her life, Rose set up a room in the house where she cared for homeless children, the elderly, and the sick. This was a beginning of social services in Peru. Though secluded in life and activity, she was brought to the attention of Inquisition interrogators, who could only say that she was influenced by grace.


What might have been a merely eccentric life was transfigured from the inside. If we remember some unusual penances, we should also remember the greatest thing about Rose: a love of God so ardent that it withstood ridicule from without, violent temptation, and lengthy periods of sickness. When she died at 31, the city turned out for her funeral. Prominent men took turns carrying her coffin.



Transformation in Christ

Imagine if you could obtain the Holy Eucharist from a vending machine. Or order a consecrated host from Amazon. Or buy a couple dozen in bulk at Costco. If you think these are absurd ideas, sacrilegious, and fully un-Catholic, consider yourself in the minority. These days, the vast majority of Catholics are not ready to embrace the real presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist (Pew Survey, 2019).

Where is Jesus, where has He gone? If we cannot believe in Our Lord present with us during the Most Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, how will we see Jesus (as Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta puts it) "in the distressing disguise of the poor." In many ways, our Diocesan Eucharistic Revival initiative asks us to consider the **Big Deal** of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. The objective is not to get everyone to return to Mass each week (although that is a nice idea), it's not to return the Church to some pedestal or inspire us to read the Bible each day (also a nice idea). Rather, the primary objective of our Eucharistic Revival - the **Big Deal** - is to renew our understanding of and belief in Jesus with us, in that sacred Host, consecrated by the priest during Holy Mass.

We are offered this precious gift every week, but do we really understand and revere the miracle we experience? Our Eucharistic Revival in September is a golden opportunity to spend just part of our day or evening listening to speakers who will inspire us to consider the Holy Eucharist as everything Christ Jesus intended it to be. Perhaps your participation in the Eucharistic Revival will affirm feelings about the Holy Eucharist which have faded like old memories. Perhaps you will be inspired by joining more than a thousand fellow worshipers in pilgrimage to the Cathedral, celebrating God's greatest gift to us, the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of His Son, Jesus Christ.

After He experienced Christ's transfiguration, death and resurrection, the Apostle Peter was ultimately driven to establish a community of believers that survives today. It is our obligation to continue to spread the Good News of the Gospel and belief in the Holy Eucharist which is so crucial to our faith tradition. Many of us, myself included, need a revival to reignite the flame of our faith. Now is the time to act!! Don't miss out on the Big Deal!


