
Here are Father Tom's scattered thoughts...

My Dear OLQW Parish family,

- 1. Happy New Year 2024! On behalf of Deacon Loc, Sr. Elizabeth Diep, Rene Asuncion, Faye Dolor and Tuan Nguyen, I would like to thank all of you for all the love and support that you have generously given to our parish and with you and your family Joy, Peace, Happiness, Love and go health this Christmas Season and throughout the New Year.
- 2. The Bishop's Appeal, we are almost there...We need your help! If you haven't given to the 2023's n Bishop's Appeal, I would like to encourage to do so, so our parish can reach its goal of \$19,600.00.
- 3. Today the Church invites us to celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany of Our Lord Jesus Christ. The word "Epiphany" means "Revelation" or "Manifestation." The Church wants us to rejoice today. This is the day when we proclaim to all the world that Jesus came to save everybody and his influence is not restricted to any one culture. As we honor this moment in time when the Christ Child was made manifest to the world, we need to look into our own hearts. There, we discover Christ's ongoing manifestation to us so that we can worship Him who has also chosen to be born within our hearts. We must diligently seek our that manifestation of God within us and respond to it in the same ways that the Magi (wise men) responded.
- 4. The Magi's journey across mountains and deserts, following the star, echoes in our hearts. We feel that we have our own star to follow—a yearning deep down within our being for meaning, truth and happiness—an individual path in life which we alone are called to tread. After this encounter, the Magi were transformed, their eyes of faith were opened, they recognized the Infant Child—God's light which had come into the world. We too have been given the eyes of faith to keep us on course as we follow Christ along the highways and by ways of life, across the desert paths of loneliness, pain, failure and illness. The Magi, after the encounter, were not the same. Then were changed forever. They were no longer following by the star, but by the light of the Infant Child.
- 5. There is something beautiful about the story of the Magi—the Wise Men or the three Kings from the East! They represent all of us on a spiritual adventure which goes on as long as life lasts. We are to be Wise Men for our day, making Jesus visible to the whole world as its Savior and Redeemer. Our special role is to make Jesus known along the pathways of life by being open and receptive to His Word. The Lord needs our commitment in furthering his work. What do we have when we come to meet the Lord Jesus? The Wise Men did not come empty handed, but with gifts...What gifts do we have for Jesus?
- 6. Christmas is about making two journeys—The journey to Bethlehem and the way home by a different route. We are all making our journey home through life. Having found Bethlehem, let us hope that at the end of life's journey, we will be met once more by Jesus, Mary and Joseph.

The visit of the Magi occurs directly before the story of the Holy Family's flight into Egypt. Matthew's Gospel tells a version of Jesus' birth that is different than the one in Luke. Of the actual birth of Jesus, Matthew tells us little more than, "When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod . . ." The story of the census is found only in Luke's Gospel, but we hear about the visit of the Magi only in Matthew's Gospel.

We know little about the Magi. They come from the East and journey to Bethlehem, following an astrological sign, so we believe them to be astrologers. We assume that there were three Magi based upon the naming of their three gifts. The Gospel does not say how many Magi paid homage to Jesus. In Matthew's Gospel, they represent the Gentiles' search for a savior. Because the Magi represent the entire world, they also represent our search for Jesus.

We have come to consider the gifts they bring as a foreshadowing of Jesus' role in salvation. We believe the meaning of the gifts to be Christological. Gold is presented as representative of Jesus' kingship. Frankincense is a symbol of his divinity because priests burned the substance in the Temple. Myrrh, which was used to prepare the dead for burial, is offered in anticipation of Jesus' death.

The word Epiphany means "manifestation" or "showing forth." Historically several moments in Christ's early life and ministry have been celebrated as "epiphanies," including his birth in Bethlehem, the visit of the Magi, his baptism by John, and his first miracle at Cana.

SAINT MARGUERITE BOURGEOYS

Saint of the Day: January 12



"God closes a door and then opens a window," people sometimes say when dealing with their own disappointment or someone else's. That was certainly true in Marguerite's case. Children from European as well as Native American backgrounds in 17th-century Canada benefited from her great zeal and unshakable trust in God's providence.

Born the sixth of 12 children in Troyes, France, Marguerite at the age of 20 believed that she was called to religious life. Her applications to the Carmelites and Poor Clares were unsuccessful. A priest friend suggested that perhaps God had other plans for her.

In 1654, the governor of the French settlement in Canada visited his sister, an Augustinian canoness in Troyes. Marguerite belonged to a sodality connected to that convent. The governor invited her to come to Canada and start a school in Ville-Marie (eventually the city of Montreal). When she arrived, the colony numbered 200 people with a hospital and a Jesuit mission chapel.

Soon after starting a school, she realized her need for coworkers. Returning to Troyes, she recruited a friend, Catherine Crolo, and two other young women. In 1667, they added classes at their school for Indian children. A second trip to France three years later resulted in six more young women and a letter from King Louis XIV, authorizing the school. The Congregation of Notre Dame was established in 1676 but its members did not make formal religious profession until 1698 when their Rule and constitutions were approved.

Marguerite established a school for Indian girls in Montreal. At the age of 69, she walked from Montreal to Quebec in response to the bishop's request to establish a community of her sisters in that city. By the time she died, she was referred to as the "Mother of the Colony." Marguerite was canonized in 1982.

Reflection

It's easy to become discouraged when plans that we think that God must endorse are frustrated. Marguerite was called not to be a cloistered nun but to be a foundress and an educator. God had not ignored her after all.
