FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Here are Father Tom's scattered thoughts...

My Dear OLQW Parish family,

- 1. Throughout the Lenten Season, we are called to deepen our spiritual practices through Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving.
- 2. Today is the 4th Sunday of Lent is also known as Laetare Sunday. The word "Laetare" comes from the Latin word which means "Rejoice." It refers to a moment of joy and encouragement during the penitential season of Lent. The vestment of this Sunday is "rose" which signifies hope and anticipation.
- 3. Scriptural readings for this Sunday focus on the theme of God's Mercy, Forgiveness, and Restoration. The Gospel highlights the encounter between Jesus and Nicodemus that emphasizes that God sent His Son into the world not to condemn but to save.
- 4. This Sunday, Laetare Sunday, marks the halfway of Lent and reminds us that Easter is coming. It encourages us to persevere in our Lenten practices with hope and joy.
- 5. As Catholics, we are called to anticipate and to rejoice, to relax but not to undermine our Lenten discipline/austerity. We are encouraged to take time to reflect on our Lenten journey, to examine our hearts and to seek God's grace. We are also invited to recognize our need for redemption and our willingness to respond to God's love and light.

May our Lenten practices of Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving draw us closer to God, openness for His mercy and fully preparing for Easter's joy.

The fourth Sunday of Lent is sometimes called Laetare Sunday. Laetare is a Latin word that means "rejoice." Traditionally, Sundays are named after the first word of the liturgy's opening antiphon. On this Sunday, the antiphon is taken from the book of the prophet Isaiah (Isaiah 66:10-11). Even as we observe our Lenten sacrifices, we rejoice in anticipation of the joy that will be ours at Easter.

Today's Gospel reading is taken from John's Gospel. It consists of two parts. The first part is the final sentence of Jesus' reply to Nicodemus, the Pharisee who approached Jesus at night. Nicodemus acknowledged Jesus as someone who had come from God and seemed to want to be a follower of Jesus. Jesus greeted Nicodemus with the observation that one must be born from above to see the Kingdom of God. The dialogue between Jesus and Nicodemus that followed was about the meaning of this phrase. Nicodemus misunderstood Jesus at every point, but there was no animosity in the questions he posed to Jesus.

In the part of the conversation with Nicodemus in today's Gospel, Jesus referred to an incident reported in the Old Testament. When the Israelites grumbled against the Lord during their sojourn in the desert, God sent venomous serpents to punish them for their complaints. The Israelites repented and asked Moses to pray for them. The Lord heard Moses' prayer and instructed him to make a bronze serpent and mount it on a pole. All who had been bitten by a serpent and then looked upon the bronze serpent were cured. By recalling this story, Jesus alludes to the salvation that would be accomplished through his death and Resurrection.

The second part of today's Gospel is a theological reflection on Jesus' words to Nicodemus. The Gospel of John is known for this kind of reflection offered within the narrative. The words of the Evangelist are in continuity with the words of the prologue to John's Gospel. In these reflections, John elaborates on a number of themes that are found in his Gospel: light and darkness, belief and unbelief, good and evil, salvation and condemnation.

In John's reflection, we find an observation about human sinfulness. Jesus is the light that has come into the world, but people preferred the darkness. We wish to keep our sins hidden, even from God. Jesus has come into the world to reveal our sins so that they may be forgiven. This is the Good News; it is the reason for our rejoicing in this season of Lent and throughout our lives.

SAINT FRANCES OF ROME

Saint of the Day: March 13



The next time you recite the Nicene Creed at Mass, think of today's saint. For it was Leander of Seville who, as bishop, introduced the practice in the sixth century. He saw it as a way to help reinforce the faith of his people and as an antidote against the heresy of Arianism, which denied the divinity of Christ. By the end of his life, Leander had helped Christianity flourish in Spain at a time of political and religious upheaval.

Leander's own family were staunch Christians: his brothers Isidore and Fulgentius were named bishops, and their sister Florentina became an abbess. Leander entered a monastery as a young man and spent three years in prayer and study. At the end of that tranquil period he was made a bishop. For the rest of his life he worked strenuously to fight against heresy. The death of the anti-Christian king in 586 helped Leander's cause. He and the new king worked hand in hand to restore orthodoxy and a renewed sense of morality. Leander succeeded in persuading many Arian bishops to change their loyalties.

Leander died around 600. In Spain, he is honored as a Doctor of the Church.

Reflection

As we pray the Nicene Creed every Sunday, we might reflect on the fact that that same prayer is not only being prayed by every Catholic throughout the world, but by many other Christians as well. Saint Leander introduced its recitation as a means of uniting the faithful. Let's pray that the recitation may enhance that unity today.
